

Dear Parents and Carers,



I am pleased to report that our Sponsored Walk enjoyed fine weather this year making it a far more enjoyable experience for all. I'm also pleased to confirm that our 2016 examination results were once again outstanding with 97% of our boys achieving 5 A\*-C grades at GCSE with English and Mathematics. It was similarly impressive picture at A Level where our boys achieved 62% A\*-B grades with a 99% overall pass rate. The majority of our Y13 leavers are moving into Higher Education with 22% of them accessing a place at one of the top Russell Group of universities. Interestingly 25% of boys have chosen to remain and study at a Kent University, perhaps in no small part due to the increasing overall cost of a degree.

Finally, work on the extension to our Sports Hall has begun. This £2 million upgrade is due for completion in July 2017 with a new gymnasium, fitness suite, two state of the art classrooms and extensive changing facilities for our boys included in the new building.

When the new development is completed, our current gymnasium which was built in

the late 1920s will be demolished creating additional playground space for the boys. Overall, it will be another exciting and significant step forward in terms of the facilities available to our boys.

## DIANA DARKE VISITS THE HARVEY TO TALK TO YEAR 12 AND 13 STUDENTS

On Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> September we were very fortunate to be able to welcome the author and journalist, Ms Diana Darke to the Harvey. Ms Darke gave a wonderful presentation to Sixth Form students from The Harvey and FSG.

Diana graduated in Arabic from Oxford University and started her career working for the British Government's General Communications Headquarters (GCHQ) in Cheltenham. She went on to specialise in the Middle East for over 30 years, living and working in a range of Arab countries as an Arabic translator and consultant for both public and private sectors. Along the way she authored 16 travel guides to the region, including Bradt's Syria, Eastern Turkey and Oman. She is now recognised as a fully independent Middle East cultural expert, and has written for the BBC website, *The Sunday Times, The Guardian* and *The Financial Times* and has been a regular broadcaster on BBC Radio 4's From Our Own Correspondent.

Using the prism of her courtyard house in Damascus, bought ten years ago as a semiderelict ruin, Diana took us on a journey into the heart of Syrian society. She explored its many layers though the metaphor of the house, whose complex restoration led her to become deeply embedded in the culture. Her talk also offered a number of new insights into the realities of life in Damascus, which went beyond the image often seen in contemporary media coverage. Diana also answered a variety of questions and autographed copies of her book 'My House in Damascus' for a number of students.

We would all like to thank Diana for taking the time to come along and meet us and for giving us so many new ideas to think about. There is a copy of Diana's book available in the school library.

## South Africa Trip 2016



Well, it all started off in the Trafalgar room with some students still trying to fit their luggage into their suitcases and others recovering after eating multiple McDonalds breakfasts before we set off! The journey to the airport and check-in all went swimmingly and the teachers were lured in to a false sense of security.... Unfortunately, the flight was delayed and this meant checking back out and retrieving our luggage. The boys handled the news extremely well, but this might have been because we

were told we were staying in Sofitel, the 5\* hotel at Heathrow. The boys each had a double room to themselves and what turned out to be the largest all you can eat breakfast buffets we had ever seen! Special praise to James Stroud, who even with lost luggage stayed positive throughout.

On arrival in Johannesburg, we were transported to our accommodation and the following day the 8hr coach journey followed by a 2hr 4x4 to the Balule Nature Reserve began!

The week in Balule was amazing. The students had a lot of activities throughout the day and evening to keep them busy. The boys became obsessed with the lecturer Keith and hero worshipped his canny ability to call the hyenas out of their caves when out in the field. Keith's lectures had great variety ranging from speciation to bird calls, elephants and ecosystem diversity. Each lecture was followed by an interactive activity such as designing a game reserve and bird identification. We were also given some great lectures on Entomology by Penny and this was followed by setting insect traps, pinning and identifying insects and foraging through elephant pool

The field trips were a favourite, particularly the game transects which involved riding on a jeep and tapping to stop should we see an animal. At this point, students had to identify the organism, decide if it was male or female and adult or juvenile. Praise must go to Mrs Chapman for spotting a leopard from 300 metres away and to Harry Cannon who was known as a chief spotter!

A personal favourite was the tracking and signs morning. The field guides and rangers set the scene of a poacher fleeing the site and dropping unnecessary weight. We then had to walk the 3-minute route and spot the items that did not belong...needless to say we were rubbish spotting 3 of the 13 items! The rangers then showed us the sunglasses in the bush, the walky-talkie by the log etc. Following this, the rangers taught us how to track and how to identify various animal tracks. We were then taught the competitive game of spitting impala poo...this gathered a mixed response from the boy's. Ha ha!

We had a spooky night at bush camp, a perfectly silent place (except for the hyena calls). Here the boys reinacted African Folk stories, had marshmallows by the fire and had an interesting toilet experience!

I could go on and on about the first week: the amazing sunsets, watching the hippos cross the water in front of our accommodation, the eating of mopane worms, boereworse and pap for dinner and the presentation evening but there just isn't room in this article!

Week 2 was in Sodwana bay and brought the challenge of snorkelling and PADI diving courses and severe rain...in the dry season! The diving was technical and not all the boys took to it and instead completed an ocean ecology course with snorkelling. Once over the seasickness they had the joy of seeing humpback whales, flying fish, dolphins and turtles.

The beach was amazing and went on for miles of white sands and a rather choppy blue ocean. Nearby was a café where the boys were only too eager to eat the burgers and chicken nuggets available. There was also a souvenir market where the boys were given money to politely haggle to gather gifts for home.

The PADI diving course was by no means easy and involved many tasks such as taking goggles (oops, masks) off and on under water, following a compass and swapping air with a partner as you watched your own supply being turned off during the training. The surge was immense and it took a while to get used to being dragged left and right by 2 metres over the seabed. However, once we were over the initial shock of being able to breath underwater we were able to take in the vast array of wildlife ranging from turtles to octopus, goat fish, parrot fish and stingrays.

Ben gave lectures on reef ecology and fish identification which came in very useful. Following this, students were free to mingle with the students from other schools, take part in an inter-school quiz (we were robbed by a miscount!), be amazed by Finley's magic tricks and on the final night we were entertained by the local Zulu dancing group run by the head chef at the camp. They raised money for charity and even manage to get the Harvey boys up dancing!

I would like to say a massive thank you to all at Opwall for their array of activities and an even bigger thank you to all our students, Mr Simpson and Mrs Chapman who made it such a lovely trip. I wish you the best of luck in your future adventures!

## HARVEY EXPEDITIONS

Having just returned from the 2016 Expedition to Ladakh (full report to follow in the Term 2 edition) we have been giving thought to our next destination. Over the years the Harvey has visited such a great variety of places it has been hard to find our next challenge. However – after much thought - the decision has been taken that Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands is where we want to go. Assembly presentations are already underway and there is a growing list of students interested in this unique opportunity. Such an expedition typically lasts around four weeks and takes place in the Summer Holidays. There are four phases to the Expedition:

1/ Acclimatisation – time to settle in and get used to the new challenging environment – we also tend to do a short trek as physical preparation for the more demanding main trek.

2/ Trekking – an extended supported trek – the visit to the Galapagos will also fit into this phase as well as a trek on the mainland.

3/ Community Project – a period of time where the Team undertake a community project. This can range from conservation work in National Parks to undertaking building projects on schools to improve learning environments.

4/ Rest and Relaxation – a few days to visit places of interest.

The Harvey Expeditions are different to any other trips in that the detailed itinerary is decided by the Team Members. Having signed up for the Expedition, the Team will meet on a regular basis to research and discuss their ideas. Over a period of time, an itinerary will be formulated which we then put into place – as such the Team really do have ownership of the whole expedition.

The benefits of being part of such an experience are obvious, not least from the personal development, and life skills elements.

Ecuador and The Galapagos Islands boast some of the most unique cultural experiences, landscapes and wildlife on this planet. The opportunity to be part of this expedition is really a once in a lifetime chance.

The Expedition is due to depart in the latter part of the Summer Term in 2019. It is open to any student currently in Year 8 and above, if at the time of departure, you would have left the Harvey this is not generally a problem as you can still be part of the team but you would need to discuss this with Mr Byles.

# Year 11 GCSE French conference – Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2016

On Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2016 year 11 experienced a full-day GCSE French workshop which was very kindly funded by the school and it was much loved by all.

A guest speaker presented the conference for the whole day. The day started with the year 11 French linguists split into 8 different groups on tables. We were each provided with a dictionary for the day and a conference information pack to keep. The day started with a brief introduction to the course. Then we focused on the reading part of the course which is worth 20% of the GCSE. We completed two activities. One in which we filled the gaps of a text with probable words. The other we read, and each table created one question based on the text. When there were 8 questions we answered each and the table that provided that question provided examiners comments. This practised our ability to understand a text and to see how specific you need to be with your answer.

After a break we then went straight back into the writing element of the course. This takes up 30% of the GCSE and you do a controlled assessment/coursework for it. He told us about the different purposes and forms of writing and then showed us how to tilt the task to develop a sophisticated piece to get an A\*. He told us how to show points of view then we had to write examples of sophisticated sentences in English to get the idea. Then we were focusing on the grammar you need to include in the writing. As a table we had to create a short presentation based on the grammatical aspect of French we were looking at. There was definitely a range of presentations; some more inspiring than others and some short but sweet!

After lunch we focused on the 20% listening aspect of the exam. He told us about the paper before practising a few listening exercises. Finally, we looked at the speaking element which is 30% of the GCSE. We were shown a lot of hints and tips that really helped when I prepared for my second speaking controlled assessment. To end the day, we had a list of subjects and we had to talk for 30 seconds on them in French with no preparation. This improvisation in French turned competitive, as we picked on each other to see who would do their improvisation next.

I would like to thank the school, Timothy Guilford (our conference speaker) and Madame Menendez and the French department for organising a beneficial and fun day.

## PSHE at the Harvey 2016

With PSHE now embedded into the tutorial system it is important to continue the hard work in the future. PSHE enables students to feel safe, make informed decisions and be able to learn in any environment and we ensure that the Harvey PSHE system develops this in all our students.

#### Why PSHE at the Harvey:

The Education Act says that every state-funded school must offer a balanced/broadly-based curriculum which:

- promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils
- prepares pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life
- promoting pupil wellbeing and pupil safeguarding
- community cohesion

#### Research, findings and Reports

Children with **higher levels of emotional, behavioural, social, and school wellbeing**, on average, have higher levels of academic achievement and are more engaged in school, both concurrently and in later years.

Children with **better emotional wellbeing** make more progress in primary school and are more engaged in secondary school.

(DfE, 2012, The Impact of Pupil Behaviour and Wellbeing on Educational Outcomes)

#### What do we do?

The system has a session a week during tutor time collapsing the vertical system so the programme creates a "spiral approach" so each year group deals with age appropriate issues. This covers as broad a spectrum as possible from the recommended PSHE programme of study.

#### **Term 1 Relationships and Bullying**

Term 1 has tackled relationships and bullying in and out of the school environment. It covered relevant topics such as the bully, the bullied, the bystander effect and combating negative relationships in a positive way. This has provided an additional platform for pupils to discuss any issues or concerns and has already proved successful in raising awareness and improving the pupils attitudes towards all kinds of bullying.

#### **Term 2 Mental Health and Respect**

Next term looks at the important issue of Mental Health and Respecting Others due to the surge in awareness of how many people are affected first hand and also the fact that spme of our boys will know someone affected by these issues. 1 in 4 people (and 1 in 10 young people) will experience a mental health problem in any given year and many of those experience stigma and discrimination. ## **National Citizen Service**

### Saying Yes to NCS

During the Summer, several pupils participated in CXK's National Citizen's Service for four weeks. This involved a training course at PGL Osmington Bay in Dorset, a life skill week at Canterbury Christchurch University and two weeks performing a Social Action project that benefits the local community around Folkestone.

### Week 1 – PGL Osmington Bay

The first week was at Osmington Bay and involved my team to get to know each other. We spent 5 days at the site participating in several team building activities including: trapeze, abseiling, rock climbing, Raft Building and Jacob's Ladder.

We tried a large range of activities that very few of us have done before and found some hidden talents (Fencing and Archery for myself). These activities paired with the beautiful Dorset



surroundings made this a really great experience.

During this week we developed our team work, communication and motivational skills which helped us for the rest of the time during our time on NCS.

One of my best experiences during this week was the last day as we did several exciting group events during the day including trapeze, sensory trail (a

blindfolded adventure trail), Jacob's Ladder and Tunnelling. This day helped us to build up a strong team spirit and also was a fun way to end the week. The day ended on a high when we went down to the beach and had a beach party to celebrate the week's achievements. This was a great way to end and we enjoyed bonding with each of the other groups from Kent and Sussex.

### Week 2 – Canterbury Christchurch University

The second week was at Canterbury Christchurch University where we stayed in University Style Accommodation getting used to University life and learning skills that are invaluable to employers and universities. These skills were presented through a number of different tasks.

One of our first tasks was to create a presentation regarding our local area which was designed to help us develop our presentation, communication and management skills. We were told to be creative which is useful for getting ourselves noticed by businesses.

My favourite task was the 'No-Bake Bake Off' as it involved our team producing a product, designing a packaging for it and marketing it to a panel of 'professional' judges from the University's kitchen staff.

This involved splitting our team into a group who would create the product and a group who would help create the packaging and design the posters for the marketing. I helped out with the marketing for our product "*Golden Glow*" which was based on the classic Rocky Road but to improve our marketing campaign we focused it on an Australian Theme (as our team leader was an Australian) and when presenting the product, we used backing sounds and Aboriginal History to

explain how we chose our design. These skills are useful when entering the world of business to ensure that your product can be remembered by consumers.

We also did some activities in the evening to relax. One of our activities was a scavenger hunt around Canterbury and a presentation which had to be done in an innovative and unique way. In the end my team (Folkestone Team 1) won and got 4 pizzas which we enjoyed on one of the



evenings which was a great way to bond with one another.

Our final evening activity was a talent show which showcased several unique talents from singing to guitar playing and to dancing. This was an amazing end to the second week and would be the last time on the course we would see the other groups from Kent.

### Week 3 and 4 - Social Action Project

The final weeks involved setting up and undertaking a social action project which would benefit the community. This project could be anything we wanted to organise from a local fête to a sponsored walk. We could raise awareness and money for any cause we wanted.



My team's project was to help raise awareness in education and health by renovating a local primary school and by participating in a sponsored bike ride. The money we raised went to Harcourt Primary School in Cheriton and Folkestone Sports Centre.

Our first part of our Social Action Project was to clean up Harcourt Primary School. To do this we did gardening, cleaning and painting the school's shed. We all helped out as much

as we could to help clean up the environment to improve the conditions for the children when they came back after the holidays. My jobs involved gardening and painting the shed. We made the school as child-friendly as we could to help facilitate their learning.

We also managed to acquire plants and other useful items for the school from Folkestone's Wyevale Garden Centre. We also went to other local businesses to provide funds for the school via a Just Giving Page we created. We also set up several social media pages to promote the cause and to keep people informed of our progress.

Our second part of our Social Action Project involved participating in a sponsored cycle equivalent to the distance across England (from North to South or around 350 miles). Our team of 12 and 3 other people who helped our cause cycled the distance as a group in 3 hours at Folkestone Sports Centre.

## **Investor in Careers**

The Harvey Grammar School is working towards Investor in Careers, which is a nationally recognised Quality Award recognising excellence in careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) provision within a school, college of further education and learning providers. We aim to develop the access that key stage 4 students have to information supporting their decisions regarding their next steps, as well as continuing the excellent work done with the sixth form in supporting their next steps.





STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics which are skills all of us needed to complete this project and task successfully. In the homework we used Mathematics to calculate turning forces. We used Science, Engineering and Technology in the project part and then Science again at Thorpe Park to calculate forces. *Sam C.* 

Firstly, we had to complete a DT homework project which consisted of creating a document and model to describe alternate energy sources. I created a virtual model of a perfect creation of my house whereas other people created just documents and also there were also some big and little models of other houses and energy sources. After we completed the homework it went in to the teachers to be judged and then about a week later we found out whether we were in the running for the STEM day. Who will get in...?

#### Sam C, Group 3, Runner-Up.

To be able to win the STEM day, our designated teams had to create a working wind turbine that was reliable and able to be used as a source of energy. To create our turbines our teams spent 4 weeks designing and creating wind turbines ready for the STEM day. These turbines were created using many different materials of which will be explained next.

Each team's turbines were made out of different materials. These materials consisted of: plywood and aluminium (blades), steel rods (screws), nylon (hub). *Our* team's turbine was made out of aluminium because it's a lightweight material, but the other teams used plywood. Most week-day afternoons, we would spend time creating the turbine. But before we could start creating our turbine, we had to designate different people to different parts so that they could create pieces for the turbine, so that each person had at least one responsibility.

To create our wind turbine, we had to create a nylon hub and carve it out using the lathe. Once we had our nylon hub ready, we could create our own screws using steel rods. We used a piece of equipment which helped us carve out a screw (we created 8 screws). Next, we created our blades; *our* team used aluminium, however, the other groups used plywood; to attach our screws to the blades. We cut out brackets which screwed onto the blades and you could put the screws into the bracket. The final step, is to attach the blades to your nylon hub which just screwed in easily.

After this whole making process, it was time to hear the results of who had made the best turbine on the STEM day. Who...will...win...? *Charlie G, Group 2, Winners.* 





The prize for winning the day was a trip to Thorpe Park and an educational talk about the park and the behind the scenes as well. Mr Byles picked a few other people to go on the trip as well who had worked hard on the whole STEM project. The journey up to Thorpe Park took around 2 hours and then we were free to go in the park for an hour before we regrouped and went for our educational talk. The talk was very interesting and covered how some of the rides at the park worked and then we had a competition to see who could create the best ride car using K-Nex. We measured whose car did the best by dropping them down a ramp and see whose went the furthest. In the end everyone who participated won 3 fast passes to any of the rides (Even though the teachers won!). For the rest of the day we had free time to go on any rides in the park and we also had an all you can eat lunch at a pizza buffet.

The whole experience was one that I will never forget and thank you to Mr Byles and Megger (Who sponsored the project) for making this happen. *Sam C, Group 3, Runner-Up.*
