#### Parents' Forum

At the end of last term, we held the most recent in our series of Parents' Forum Meetings. These are held three times a year and their purpose is to allow parents to share their perspectives and experiences of a number of key points in their sons' school life.

We have had a number of very successful meetings in this programme over the past few years covering a wide range of subjects. We have received excellent feedback from parents who welcomed the opportunity to discuss important topics informally and who particularly enjoyed being able to visit classes on a Learning Walk. The points raised in discussion have been invaluable to the school and allowed us to make further improvements to our procedures.

We met last term on Wednesday 29 March and our topic was *Transition to the Sixth Form at The Harvey*.

Mr Goodfellow began the meeting with an overview of the topic from the school's perspective and parents then had the opportunity to ask questions and to share their experiences from their families' perspectives. The following points were raised:


- Some parents suggested we might incorporate "soft" life skills, e-safety and advice and guidance on alternative pathways, particularly on apprenticeships and on industry-sponsored degrees into the PSHE programme at post 16.

  All of these very useful suggestions will be considered for inclusion in next year's revised Sixth Form PSHE programme
- Some parents were interested in an information evening on the UCAS process and the transition to university study.
   We will investigate possible ways to help parents to understand this process in more detail and to become more involved in the UCAS process. This may involve an information evening or possibly an alternative approach.
- One parent asked if the school had considered allowing individual subjects to present on Sixth Form Information Evening.
   This will be discussed with curriculum leaders and our current arrangements will be reviewed.
- One parent asked about opportunities for Y13 students to mentor Y12s.

  We will investigate creating opportunities for this either through the current peer mentoring system or through the revised Sixth Form tutoring system.

Details of our next meeting will be available next term. We warmly welcome parents to come along to this discussion. Developing a shared understanding of the important stages in the boys' school lives has been of great benefit and has allowed us to continue to improve.

# **London Regeneration**


On Thursday  $20^{th}$  April two classes of Year 12 Geographers visited London on a fieldwork trip to investigate urban regeneration.

After a relatively quick journey, we arrived at the O2. We were soon swept away by the knowledge that we would have to travel on the Emirates Air Line which was a terrifying 90m above the River Thames, despite some people's apprehension everyone enjoyed the ride and


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Afterwards, we visited Royal Victoria Docks in order to investigate the extent to which it had been regenerated. Here we carried out three environmental surveys as well as collecting other data before continuing onto Canning Town. In Canning Town we carried out clone town surveys among other methods and this showed that the area was in need of regeneration. Next we travelled on the Dockland Light Railway to Westfield Shopping Centre, another recently regenerated part of London, where we stopped off for lunch.

Once we had eaten our fill of free cereal samples, we were off to our last study site, Canary Wharf, where we carried out further surveys and questionnaires. The impact of regeneration on this area was also very clear to see with many high rise buildings and people in suits rushing around. After a final trip on the Emirates Air Line back over to the O2 we headed home with the knowledge of how to investigate regeneration in an urban area.

# **Stewart Ross – local author.**

On Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> May, Stewart Ross, a local author, kindly gave his time to talk to students at the Harvey about his work. Of particular interest was his book 'The Soterion Mission', which pupils have been reading and engaging with in English lessons.

It is a post-apocalyptic novel with an intriguing storyline that includes no adults; the author explained that he wanted to explore what age someone is capable of becoming an adult, and ridding the book of grown-ups was the best way to accomplish this.

All who were lucky enough to be there enjoyed themselves immensely, with good feedback from those who heard the talk. He showed the inside workings of his authors mind, and explained the ideas, concepts and inspirations for the book.



A large part of the talk was opened up for questions, which came in abundance. These ranged from asking for guidance on how to get into the writing industry to asking how long it took to publish 'The Soterion Mission'.

Overall, a great session that was enjoyable for all. Many thanks to the brilliant Stewart Ross for his service.

## **Beacon Schools Programme: Holocaust Education**

As part of The Harvey's role as one of the select few University College London Beacon Schools across the country, specialising in Holocaust education, the History, R.E. and English departments have been working together to improve the standard of Holocaust education for our students. The benefits of our work will also be felt by students in eight other schools across Kent.



As part of the Beacon Schools Programme, Mr Duncan attended a four-day residential in London in October, and went on a four-day visit to Poland – including the Warsaw Ghetto and Treblinka death camp – in May.

Emma O'Brien, from University College London, delivered teacher training in May, ensuring that all teaching staff have a secure understanding of the Holocaust so that we are better equipped to help our students intellectually and emotionally when learning about this event.

The Harvey remains committed to teaching excellence, and will continue to build on this year's work in future years so that knowledge and understanding of the Holocaust continues to improve across all year groups and subjects.

# 'A Tale of A Nail' Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2017

Due to the high demand for main parts in school productions; some KS3 pupils showed a very keen interest in performing a play which was solely open to their key stage, enabling them to play main characters. So after Easter a group of 17 pupil from year 7-9 started to rehearse a one act play called 'Tale of a Nail'. We follow an

Gouche' through the events which happen in his body after he hits a nail through his thumb. We see how the germs and thrombocytes battle it out to stop tetanus and heal Mr Gouche.

excites me to see how much enthusiasm there is for extracurricular plays across all the year groups and the dedication the pupils put into the rehearsal process, learning lines and remembering blocking.


