

Year 8 and 9 drama showcase

On Friday 23rd March the year 8 and 9 drama students took part in a showcase of devised pieces which they created, rehearsed and performed in front of 65 audience members. The audience number was the best seen, next year the showcase will have to take place in the hall, where there is more capacity for such an audience. Each performance group, within each year group decided on a performance they wanted to work on, choosing costumes, making props, thinking about music, sound effects and lighting to aid their performances.



These showcases are so important for our younger drama students. Most of our year 8 pupils have not performed in front of an audience before and to perform in front of 65

members, all rather squashed in the drama room, was a massive achievement. It gives the pupils confidence and experience of what a live performance is like; and for our more professional younger pupils, it allows them to demonstrate just how much talent they have on stage.

This year the number of students participating meant that the showcase was just over an hour and a half and my gratitude goes out to all those parents, relatives and friends who came and watched each performance.

The performances ranged from comical to emotional, war to friendship; each unique and equally creative. The talent and enthusiasm for drama continues to grow in the school and the talent amongst our boys continues to shine. A very well done to all my year 8 and 9 drama students who participated in the showcase.

39 Steps





On Monday 26th March, the year 10 GCSE drama class performed '39 Steps'. The course requires the study of a play from text into performance, which the students then have to answer questions in during the written exam at the end of year 11. The group had been rehearsing and understanding the play since January. 39 Steps is a comedy and a well-known classic.





As a class they decided to perform using a stylised, minimalistic set, adding comedy through physical theatre, using toys as props and playing both male and female roles.





Line learning proved most difficult for the group, as well as maintaining the very demanding fast pace throughout the two acts. A few of the cast soon realised they could not just 'wing it' on the night and indeed, performing a comedy is quite different to performing in the Harvey pantomime.





However, there were moments of comic genius from many of the year 10s. Luke C's performance was consistent, funny, well physicalised and successfully timed. Emile W, George D and Lewis H bought both serious and comedy through body language and gesture, while Jamie W and Dominic V sustained multiple accents throughout the performance, bringing humour to each scene.





The year 10s were very fortunate to perform in front of a very willing audience after school and created an entertaining evening, hopefully preparing them from the practical performances which await them throughout year 11.



HOCKEY

Another successful year building on the Elite Performance Squads see the improvements in teams and individuals in hockey. Although we don't see the same success as the football scheme there have been some very noticeable improvements in individual skills and more pupils starting at the Folkestone Optimists. The Monday after school club regularly had over 20 pupils from Key Stage 3 and hopefully the school will be able to offer more clubs next year.

The Year 7 team shows an enormous amount of promise with at least 10 of the current team training and playing at Folkestone. Will D, Garrett L, and Charlie P look to be quality prospects for the future with other pupils looking to join them as well. Similarly the year 8's have a strong presence at Folkestone with Leo C joining the Kent hockey set up (his Kent coach was very complimentary). Unfortunately there are not so many club players in years 9 and 10 but Mr Bristow has led some very good year 10 EPS sessions during their games lessons which the boys have really appreciated. It is the 1st XI that has a real depth of Folkestone players with 3 or 4 players regularly playing in the 1st XI and the majority of the rest of the team playing 2nd XI or below. This really has helped with the East Kent League and Frank Mason hockey tournament.

The 1st XI narrowly missed out in the semi-final of the cup competition to a strong Tonbridge Grammar team losing 2-0. Players such as captain Nick W; and England U18 prospects Will M and Conal B shone on the day beating some very good Grammar and Private Schools to have one of our most successful tournaments in recent history. There is a real chance of developing the team in the next 2 years to be in a force in the local area.

The U15's travelled to Canterbury on Thursday 15th March for the annual Peter Firminger Trophy. The Harvey were placed in a very tough group including a strong St. Lawrence College who were successful nationally last year. Following the completion of the morning games The Harvey came fourth in the group which meant that were to play in the afternoon plate competition with other 3rd/4th placed schools from the three other groups. The Harvey met Sir Roger Manwoods in the 1/4 finals and triumphed 2-1 after going a goal behind. The two goals scored by Josh W were very well taken and resulted from the good interchanging of passes by forwards and midfield including Cohen D and Alfie M. The Harvey then met Kings' Canterbury in the semi-final and at the end of full time the teams were deadlocked at 0-0. This resulted in penalty flicks. Despite a couple of saves from Max P in goal the Harvey went down 3-1 sending a lucky Kings' side through to the final after winning two penalty flick competitions in a row. The commitment of the U15 hockey team has been excellent this year. They have all worked hard in EPS sessions and improved individually and as a team with the hope that they will finish in the top half of the East Kent Schools Hockey League.

The younger teams had mixed success against some strong opposition in the league with Simon Langton and Sir Roger Manwoods coming out on top in most cases, winning their respective leagues. The Year 8 tournaments showed some promise and the second of them showed a marked improvement. Although the team came 3rd in their group of 4 they may well have come second but for a last second goal in their last qualifying game. They then came 10th overall winning 2 of their 3 afternoon games. 1sec different and they would have been in the top 8!

Well done to all pupils and staff who have put in so much effort this year and to parents who have travelled to games and dedicated their time to the sport.

FOOTBALL

1stXI County Cup Final



The Harvey Grammar School's match on the 24th of March was an intense match but still interesting. It then came to 32 minutes in and player 99 on the opposing team took a fall as well as. 2 minutes after play resumed, player 9 from Queen Elizabeth, scored from a free kick on the edge of the Harvey area. 7 minutes after that, another goal to QES from a quick counter attack meaning QES were 2-0 up at the break.

By the time I was back out, the game had already started again, however no goals had been scored as of yet. By this point, Harvey were much more dominant. This



pressure resulted in a goal from Yr11 Ashis R. The added effort from the Harvey meant that our boys were starting to tire. This meant a lot of stops in play for treatment. All got back up to their feet quickly though.

We scored our second goal 13 minutes before the end of the match after a well taken corner was headed in by Tom C. Despite some late pressure from our boys, that was the final score. Harvey 2 QES 2. This lead to extra time having to be played, with an extra 20 minute. Harvey were tired by this point, so come halfway through the second half we were out on our feet, having to make constant subs for tired players. This inevitably allowed QES back in ot the game, something they capitalised on when they scored the winning goal with 4 minutes to play. End of the game came and players from both teams began to shake hands in a sign of respect of how hard all hard played.

Our team showed good sportsmanship by getting their awards and then waited for QE to get their winning trophy before heading in. For my first match reporting, it was enjoyable.
