

Year seven French Trip




The annual Year 7 French trip to Boulogne will be taking place on the 18th & 25th March 2019. The students will be visiting a French school and the Becasus sweet factory, among other activities on a day that gives them the opportunity to immerse themselves in the French language and culture.



A' Level Chemistry



Our Y13 Chemists were lucky enough to enjoy two visits this term. The first was to Givaudan where they research and manufacture perfumes for everything from bleaches and air fresheners through to fine perfumes. Our lads really enjoyed using the Oculus Rift VR goggles to find themselves in the African savannah with elephants. The researchers could then add in the smells of the grass and change the heat of the cubicle to make it a more real experience. This helps them to understand how smells affect our experience of the world. Students also enjoyed seeing the manufacturing site where the ingredients are combined to make fine perfumes. We also got to try toothpastes from around the world.



At Pfizers our students got to analyse the aspirin that they had made in the school laboratories on multi-million pound research grade machinery. It was so pleasing to see them working alongside professional research chemists. They then got to talk through the findings in a tutorial with Don Clark who uses these spectroscopic techniques every day.

Art with Strange Cargo



Four Harvey art students Harry W, Harvey P, James E and Will F were chosen to collaborate on a project with local arts company, Strange Cargo. A full sized model of a horse was painted and adorned with dazzle camouflage and military badges. The students researched and studied World War One military insignia relating to the regiments of Cheriton's fallen servicemen and the regiments that travelled through the town's Shorncliffe Barracks. These were digitally reproduced as decals.

Research was also carried out into dazzle camouflage techniques created for naval vessels by Norman Wilkinson, which were reproduced and painted onto the horse sculpture as part of the project and the insignia decals were affixed all over the horse.

The finished piece was displayed at Strange Cargo during our talk by historian Vince Williams and then outside the school, over the weekend of the centenary of the Armistice. A poppy wreath was also created, that also included a number of purple poppies to commemorate the animals who died in WWI. The accompanying panel shared all of the regiments detailed on the horse and also informed people that over

8,000,000 horses and other animals played an important role in military services during the First World War.



Holocaust Memorial Day

On Friday 25 January 2019, a commemoration service was held at Folkestone Methodist Church to mark the annual Holocaust Memorial Day. This is an internationally recognised day to remember the millions of people who were murdered or whose lives were changed beyond recognition during the Holocaust, as well as remembering those lives lost and affected in subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

The Theme set by the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust for 2019 was 'Torn from home'. This encouraged the pupils and audiences to reflect on how the enforced loss of a safe place to call 'home' is part of the trauma faced by anyone experiencing persecution and genocide. 'Home' usually means a place of safety, comfort and security.




The service was led by the Mayor's Chaplain, Father Stephen Bould and attended by the Town Mayor, Town Councillors, local dignitaries and students from a range of local schools and colleges. A small group of year 12 students, comprised of Ben T, George G, Ciaran H and James S, took part on behalf of The Harvey Grammar School. They undertook their own research on the genocides in Cambodia and Rwanda and then each performed their own reading to help inform others about these awful acts. The boys both prepared and performed with sincerity and maturity – thank you to Ben, George, Ciaran and James for contributions which added to the significance of the event and helped to inform others in attendance.

A-Level Geography Fieldwork: London and Margate



Term 3 was a busy month for the Harvey's A-level Geographers who undertook two days of fieldwork in London and Margate. Both trips provided the boys with opportunities to observe and investigate the changes which regeneration of place, one of the key topics in their A-Level course. The first day offered the chance to visit the former docklands in the east-end of London to see whether economic, social and environmental regeneration had led to the successful rebranding of the area, following their closure and disuse in the late 1970's and early 1980's. Whereas the second day allowed the pupils to investigate the attempts to regenerate Margate towards its former heyday as a thriving British seaside town. Despite the particularly chilly winter weather at both locations, the boys were able to gather valuable primary data on these themes, with the ultimate aim of practicing the wide range and various complexity of the data collection and sampling they will need to conduct for their non-examined assessment (NEA) which they will begin over the summer holidays.



Does Margate have what it takes to successfully regenerate?




Victoria Docks in London, once the heart of the industrial east end.

In London, the first calling point was North Greenwich, more precisely the O2 arena, where pupils could see how regeneration is a continually evolving process. The example they were given was the O2 itself; now a successful sport, music and retail venue, but an example of successful rebranding from its origins as the Millennium Dome (launched in 2000, ironically to provide much needed regeneration to this area of London), which was largely perceived in the media to have been a failure.

An opportunity to collect data here was followed by a trip on the air line..... (Emirates Airline – more evidence of rebranding in the area) across the Thames to Victoria Docks. This was an undoubted highlight for the pupils who could witness, from a privileged position how the regeneration of these former industrial areas was not a wide spread as initially thought, with clear differences seen on opposing banks of the river.



Does regeneration and rebranding fair better on one side of the Thames to the other?

Once on the north side of the Thames the boys undertook a brisk investigation of the Victoria docks in order to gather further data and appreciate how regeneration has been achieved in numerous forms; firstly through the striking and contemporary looking Excel centre at one end of the docks to the housing developments embedded amongst the former cranes used in the dockyards at the other; blending regeneration with the industrial heritage of the area.

After gathering further data in Canning town and a quick trip on the DLR to Stratford the pupils had the opportunity to assess the impact which the 2012 Olympic games has had on the area. After a quick bite to eat at Westfield, it was off again on the Jubilee line south bound towards Canary Wharf, a place well known to the boys from their studies of it in lessons. The final stop on their whistle-stop tour of east London gave the boys a chance to further collect data on the quality of the environment, number of pedestrians and traffic vehicles in the area, but also to reflect on the ways in which regeneration had taken on many different shapes and forms in a relatively small area of London.


In early February, our A-level geographers undertook fieldwork a bit closer to home, making the relatively short trip up to the North Kent Coast to Margate. Much like the London fieldwork day the pupils were investigating the impact of regeneration, albeit on a smaller town. Similarly though pupils were given a wide scope of data to collect, however with more of an emphasis on the pupils applying and collecting data specific to hypothesis which they had developed themselves in the lessons prior to undertaking their fieldwork. Many themes were investigated such as the impact which regeneration was having on the levels of globalisation in Margate, or the extent to which coastal landscapes and processes influenced people's perceptions on Margate's regeneration.



Pupils began their day's data collection at the acclaimed Turner Contemporary Gallery, which at a cost of £17.5 million has become the beacon for the regeneration of Margate. From this point, the pupils could collect data to assess the impact, which the gallery was having on the immediate area and town of Margate as a whole.



This gave pupils ample opportunity to gather rich primary data on how this once famous seaside town is at a crossroads in its history. Critics have suggested the 'Turner Contemporary has emphasised cultural consumption and economic regeneration at the expense of the local residents due to its failure to engage with local artists, and that the gallery underpins the erosion of the town's 'traditional' seaside features and that any regeneration has and will create high levels of gentrification like parts of Brighton or Whitstable'.



Is the Turner Contemporary the answer to successful regeneration in Margate?


After two days of comprehensive data collection and investigation, the pupils have been able to observe and better gauge the success of regeneration over time and in two locations of contrasting size. Importantly moving forwards pupils have been able to apply and refine their data collection and fieldwork skills in preparation for their NEA's which they will soon undertake. Next up is a trip to Greatstone in term 4 to investigate and collect data on the wide range of coastal processes at play with the boys developing an ever-wider range of independent investigation skills, with a final self-guided fieldwork day in Ashford to come in term 5.

So, for first of the season a 2-1 loss to a good Sutton Valance team was not bad.

Later we faced the Duke of York's Royal Military School away for a league match in which we topped a convincing score of 9-3 thanks to goals from Sam R (3), Leo C (4), Sam M (1) and Will P (1). The team played an excellent game of hockey despite the miserable wet conditions, with MVP's going to Sam M playing out of position as an Inside Forward and Sam R for corker reverse-stick goal. A very good match for the team.

Next, we faced Sir Roger Manwood's at home where the team collectively were extremely strong in all areas of the pitch and this payed off with a brilliant 8-1 win against a team who in the past had been quite a challenge.
