

European Day of Languages at The Harvey



It was such a lovely surprise to receive a poster through the post from Tangso. It made my day!! I hope that you are enjoying your new home and school. Mrs Savva










Christ Church **CEP** Academy

F24




F24 is a youth led green power challenge that involves constructing an electric vehicle that is raced against other schools from the UK in famous F1 tracks like Silverstone.

Biology Department Forensics' Day



A massive thank you to Sam from MEBP for running the day's activities and a thank you to those Year 10 who took part – you were engaged, thoughtful and meticulous in your work!

It was enjoyable to watch the students learn about the range of careers on offer in the field of forensics; digital forensics, anthropology, forensic accounting and pathology just to name a few. The final presentations were well put together, with a clear divide in a guilty verdict between two of the suspects.

I hope the event sparked interest in the students and showed them how Biology can be applied to real life situations. *Mrs Bennett*



The Forensics science day was a very enjoyable and interesting experience. I learnt a lot about the world of forensics during the time Sam was here including the different aspects of science that are included and all the different branches of science that can take you to being a forensics scientist or investigator.

I really enjoyed the activities that we participated in, collecting data and information about different suspects as well as the victim. The collecting of evidence from the different scenarios was really interesting as well as being calculated and meticulous. The bit that I enjoyed the most was collecting prints using the magnetic dust because it was really fascinating watching the prints become clear as the dust stuck to the oil left from the person's finger.

It was interesting to learn about how the police department collect and store data such as prints, and moulds taken from the scene to catalogue and store for later use. I learned that there are three types of fingerprints - arch, loop or whorl. You can different types of fingerprint on the same hand, for example I have 2 arches on my left hand, but all the rest are loops. Overall, I really enjoyed the experience and I think that I learnt a lot. *AJ Yr10*





There were many activities. We started in five groups, understanding how a forensic scientist would extract a footprint. By using good solutions which harden, we could extract, mould, and examine to determine whose it was.

Later on, we were introduced to other factual talks on forms of evidence and how you would examine, analyse, and compare them in a real-life situation. This included blood, fingerprints or fingermarks, and DNA.

It was fascinating to see and explore how so many different and diverse sciences (from computer science to pathology) can all be used in realworld examples. My favourite was how you can determine so many factors about someone just by their spine. We had some fun training in fingerprint examination and handwriting forgery before we had a full-on investigation.

We used the knowledge that we had learnt from the exercises to examine the crime scene in many different ways. We could:


- Examine DNA analysis.
- Explore computers' data files.
- Consider who and why fingerprints were found at that place.
- Ponder how the suspects' history could all tie into the murder.
- Survey the crime scene.
- Investigate clothes and evidence left at the crime scene.

In the end, we all in our teams created a report of our findings and determined who murdered the teacher, why we think that and what evidence we have to show.

This was a lot of fun because it wasn't just some small exercise sprinkled throughout the day, but a full-fledged investigation that allowed everyone to participate regarding their strength. *LB Year 10*

PSHE is a vital part of the school's education programme and helps children and young people to stay safe, healthy and prepared for life's challenges.



A growing body of research shows that pupils who are emotionally healthy do better at school. PSHE education helps children and young people to achieve their potential by supporting their wellbeing and tackling issues that can affect their ability to learn, such as anxiety and unhealthy relationships. PSHE education also helps pupils to develop skills and aptitudes such as teamwork, communication, and resilience. These are crucial to navigating the challenges and opportunities of the modern world, and are increasingly valued by employers.

The school works with the PSHE Association, updating our curriculum in line with government regulations, to ensure that our students are regularly accessing the most current up to date resources and information. We will be using a progressive spiral model, in which students will study three key themes throughout their time at The Harvey - Health & wellbeing, Living in the wider world and Relationships.

We also have close links with Kent Police, along with local charities & support groups who assist us with our delivery.

A few thoughtful and wise words from our student Eco Council, along with a request for Students and Parents/Carers help in their drive towards a greener world.

Throughout human history we have relied on very basic forms of energy; human muscle, animal muscle and the burning of biomass such as wood or crops. However, things took a turn for possibly the worst in the Industrial Revolution when we began to use a whole new energy resource: fossil fuels. Fossil energy has been a fundamental driver of the technological, social, and economic development which has followed.

As we (students and parents) are aware, the burning of fossil fuels has many negative impacts on the environment. When these fossil fuels are burnt, they produce carbon dioxide and are the largest driver of global climate change. They are also a major contributor to local air pollution, which is estimated to aide millions of premature deaths each year. At the end of this article, I will give two tips to help cut down on Carbon Dioxide emissions at school, one for the students and one for the parents.

It is evident that everyone needs to do their bit at the Harvey to help cut down on Carbon Dioxide emissions, as this will benefit not only the students at the school, but also the local people of Cheriton and Folkestone. During my time at the school, I have been pushing for us to become more eco-friendly, and now that I have reached the Sixth form, I feel just as strongly about combatting global warming as I did in my younger years at the Harvey, and as I am now in a position where I am fortunate enough to have an opportunity to get my message across, I will do so.

One way that the students can help combat climate change, and help slow down global warming, is to simply use a reusable bottle. 86% of plastic water bottles used in the UK either end up in landfill or as litter. Not only will using a reusable bottle be better for the environment, it will also be cheaper. According to a study completed by Friends of the Earth charity, the average cost of bottled water is 65p per litre, whereas tap water costs only 0.1p per litre. With this in mind, it is cheaper and better for the environment to get a reusable bottle.

The parents of Harvey boys could help in many ways, but my tip for you today is to simply turn off the engine of your car whenever you are waiting- specifically when you are waiting for your child to finish school. On average, idling used up to ½ gallon of fuel per hour. If you were waiting for your child for, say 15 minutes, every week you'd be costing yourself one pound, and that's just from waiting outside of school. Furthermore, every week you'd emit 554.4 grams of carbon dioxide a week. So, with all this in mind, I think that it is clear that we all need to be more environmentally conscious and do our bit to help cut down emissions at a local level.

In this age of faster, larger and quieter cars it is imperative that we all help to ensure safe roads for our children. A large number of Harvey students walk to school and need to cross Cheriton Road directly outside of the school. We have the large yellow zig-zag lines across each side of our entrances, inline with the crossing islands, giving the students a safe, clear crossing. As the risks become greater during the darker winter months, may we respectfully ask that the no stopping rules that come with these lines are adhered to by all.


It is pleasing to see so many Year 9 applying again and succeeding after successful initiation into the Leadership scheme last year.
