Author Visit Article - Louisa Young

Louisa Young, distinguished novelist, songwriter and biographer, visited the Harvey to share some of her impressive works, such as "Twelve months and a day "and, moreover, her captivating life stories. With a marvellous, comedic swagger she narrated the darker times of her youth and her time at Cambridge, falling into the arms of alcoholism and a series of lamentable love affairs. These times, however, shaped her meandering path to journalism, and helped craft the beautifully tragic fiction in many of the books that have contributed to her success in the industry. The Q&A at the end of her visit was incredibly useful to the A-level students, not just as an insight into the life of an author, but to gain advice on how to harness their own



creative capabilities, and channel that into their writing. Young's flair for the theme of romance and merciless addiction has undoubtedly informed my own coursework.

On Wednesday the 9th of November, year 13 were fortunate enough to pick the brain of popular novelist Louisa Young in a Q & A session. Through her diverse career, we discussed a plethora of topics gaining a real insight into some of the ways a passion for English can be applied. Young explained the meticulous process behind writing a number of her most popular novels, for example, the depth of research she put in surrounding facial reconstruction surgery for the award-winning novel 'My Dear I Wanted to Tell You'. Young also didn't shy away from acknowledging the personal connection she holds to certain books such as

'Twelve Months and a Day' – a book heavily linked to the loss of her husband. Moreover, Young detailed very honestly the blend of both glamour and frustration involved in her job recounting her experiences travelling the world with her daughter promoting the novel 'Lionboy', whilst also acknowledging her recent struggles with writer's block. Following Young's talk, many students appreciated how interesting and wonderfully open she was, answering every question with attentiveness and enthusiasm.

This term, on the 9th of November, the year 12 English class had the chance to meet acclaimed author Louisa Young. With 18 books-worth of experience, she spoke on every aspect of the writing process – from the conception of an idea to the publishing and even the greenlighting of book covers.

The red bereted writer began by displaying the plethora of books that she has had published. One of her most popular books is "My Dear I Wanted to Tell You"- a war story based on the real-life events that occurred during the first world war involving the field service post cards which censored and minimised the seriousness of the injury messages sent back to soldiers' loved ones. Ms Young talked about how she realises what she wants to write about next, recalling her visit to a war medicine exhibition which planted the idea that became the novel.

Ms Young spoke in a relaxed and conversational style, encouraging all students to join in and ask questions. It took place much like a question-and-answer session, making it a relatively personalised hour and a half.

One exercise Ms Young asked the students to partake in was called "I remember when", in which students had to write down five random memories from throughout their lives, be-it laugh inducing, emotional, monotonous or any other feeling, and allow these memories to inspire the author inside of them, either writing an account of it, or drawing off the emotion it supplies. At the end of the session, I spoke briefly to Louisa Young about a short story of hers that I had read: "Heathcliff's I Have Known", praising it for its truthfulness, and for how much I agreed with her opinion, and, peering over her roundframed glasses, she thanked me humbly, as I left having been inspired to write myself.

A Level Chemistry

Eight Yr13 Chemists were taken on an industrial visit to Givaudan as part of their Chemistry course. The students could not believe the diverse degree backgrounds that were used at the company from psychology, bio- medical and engineering as well as chemistry.



The students used the world's first portable brain mapping software which allows the scientists to measure the effect of fragrances on brain waves! They know if you like it!

We also got a chance to have a look at the Mal-odour lab which synthesizes bad smells found around the home so that the chemists can make effective counteracting fragrances. The students also got to see the robotic store where automated machines move pallets of chemicals up to fourteen stories high and the mixing building where fragrances from soap powder up to high end perfume are produced.

The students were a great credit to the school and really enjoyed the visit!

F1 in Schools

24 boys in Y7-9 have been working hard in an afterschool STEM club to design and make model F1 Race Cars that they have the opportunity to test and race!

The boys have been working really hard and learning a lot about Aerodynamics and Car Designing using Computer Design tools as well as practical hand tools. They are now at the stage where the cars are being tested and Raced on a specially designed school racetrack that we now have. The cars can travel at speeds up to 70kph!

<u>A Level Geography</u>

During term 3 Year 12 Geographers visited a variety of sites in the East End of London, starting with Canary Wharf. Here students interviewed passing pedestrians and collected data including their own observations of the area

that was regenerated into an urban enterprise zone in the 1980s. Students then relocated to Greenwich, briefly stopping at the O2 which was built by the government as an exhibition centre to celebrate the start of the 21st century. They then took the cable car to Royal Victoria Dock where they investigated an area that once contained warehouses busy with dockworkers loading and unloading ships but is now largely residential. Year 12 then walked past the ExCel centre (an international exhibition and conventional centre) and the newly opened Elizabeth line into Canning Town an area of Newham which has not yet been regenerated, the rows of empty shops and houses with boarded up windows



provided a stark contrast to the million-pound apartments on the other side of the tracks. Year 12 finished their fieldwork with a stroll through the Olympic Park in Stratford, an area regenerated for the 2012 Summer Olympics and now being further developed with an eye on adding cultural and educational opportunities to the area. Homeward bound aboard the HS1 train it was clear that regeneration was the theme of the day. **Miss Chapman**



Canary Wharf

Canary Wharf is the area of London located on the old site of the West India Docks; it is one of the main financial centres of the UK. After the closing of the London docklands billions was invested into the area along with tax reductions for businesses that encouraged them to come to Canary Wharf. We carried out an environmental quality survey of Canary Wharf: the area was highly urbanised and there was very efficient public transport with the DLR, and bikes were available to anyone. This would reduce



carbon emissions greatly and there was a surprising lack of pollution due to these initiatives. Folkestone could take note and put some funding into schemes like these and it would benefit greatly.

This was continued as there was very little visible litter which was shocking as there were so many people compared to the amount you find in Folkestone town; bins were available but didn't clutter the plaza and the ground was kept clean, no vandalism, lots of green spaces which was put a priority.



We also went to Canning town which was very different from Canary Wharf as it has not received the same funding for development and has fallen into a dire state. There is potential for regeneration but the funding needs to be there, and it cannot be continued to be ignored. Canning town with closed shops in the background.

Regeneration - London Docklands



On the 26th of January 2023, year 12 Geography visited London for a fieldwork trip to see the regeneration of London in person after previously learning about it in class. This image on the left is from the cable cars and successfully shows the regeneration of the docklands, as it has switched from an industrial area to a business which is successfully shown by the buildings which contain offices. This also provides good land use.



This image to the left shows that some areas have been neglected and forgotten about and have not been regenerated yet.

Overall the trip was a huge success as it enabled us to bring what we learnt in class to life and make it easier for us to visualise the regeneration.

Regeneration trip to London Docklands

On this regeneration trip we visited the London Docklands, O2 area, Canary Wharf, Canning Town and Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, sporting complex and public park in Stratford.

These areas of south London were chosen as they are areas of contrasting deprivation levels as a result of their various regeneration schemes. For instance, Canary Wharf home to some of the UKs largest banking companies such as JP Morgan where the average salary of an employee in this section of London well exceeds the national average. Here, there has been multiple successful regeneration schemes that have taken place which you can see in



the picture on the left which includes many skyscrapers style buildings, high quality lunch and dinner restaurants.

In contrast, we went to an area close to Canary Wharf called Canning Town, this was an area of high deprivation that lacked regeneration. In this area it was clear that regeneration was required to promote this place for potential migration and investors for future change. The majority of the shops here were closed and houses were boarded up. Bailey B.

Maths at The Harvey

Parallel, a charity that supports high-attaining students to excel in mathematics, has partnered with the Harrow school, to offer a 5-week problem solving course to 45 students aged 10-12 across England. The course involves a variety of mathematical problems which are completed online and delivered by sixth form students at Harrow School. Students work in small teams on a Microsoft Teams call. Simon Singh who is the creator of Parallel has an oversight of the course and the Head of Maths at Harrow school organised the programme.

We are incredibly proud of Max L in Year 7 who applied to take part and was selected. He is an inspiration to other students to put go above and beyond with their mathematical abilities. Well done Max!
