Biology Department A-level AQA Examiner Day

A massive thank you to Dr Singh from Keynote for running the day's activities. With 30 years teaching experience, 10+ years of being an AQA examiner and a writer of several books' Dr Singh had valuable insights for our students. Also, a thank you to those Year 12 and 13 who took part – you were engaged and thoughtful throughout the day.

The day was divided it to segments covering areas that the Biology Department felt the students would find most beneficial based on marking and class feedback. Meiosis and Immunity were the knowledge-based areas, then Math and Stats work and finally work on the 25 marks Biology essay ready for paper 3.

I hope the event was of use to the students and showed them how an AQA examiner views their written responses and how best to construct their answers going forward. *Mrs Bennett*





Today's session helped me to understand some difficult topics in the specification. One that was explained very nicely was meiosis. I thought I knew all there was to know about this topic until our recent mock exam when I scored low on an exam question based on it. To have it explained by an examiner was helpful as I now know what key points to hit when asked about it. I asked some questions one to one with the examiner and she told me exactly what I needed to know like I was asking a talking mark scheme.

I struggle a lot in biology with putting on the paper what the examiner wants to hear. I see a question and I write everything I know. To be told what the examiner wants you to write about in different situations was the most valuable thing I took away from today.

The essay preparation was also useful as it allowed us to think like examiners and know what they look for in our essays to reach top marks. *ZD Year 13*



The Biology Day with Dr. Singh for the year 12 and year 13 Biology classes was an exceptionally helpful tool for bettering exam approaches. The method of answering a question and immediately crosschecking and evaluating the answers with the mark scheme for correction (followed by a later attempt at a similar question) was a brilliant tool to apply in revision for a variety of intricate questions. Dr. Singh herself was incredibly efficient in her delivery of information and exam technique and her usage of booklets hand-outs for note-taking of PowerPoint information definitely raised engagement.

The essay writing portion of the day was unquantifiable insightful and was most certainly the most useful part of the day, being accessible to both years (much like the rest of the day), but still helpful to both years without exceeding the reach of year 12's or serving as redundant to the year 13's. During the morning of the A-level Biology conference, we looked at maths skills in the exams and covered some year 1 content. This was very useful to look over, as maths makes up at least 10% of the marks in A-level Biology, making this part of the session beneficial for both the year 12s and 13s in solidifying knowledge and increasing confidence in frequently needed skills for the exams.

The year 1 content revisited was good for both years; as it put the topics into exam context with understanding- AO1- applying- AO2-evaluating and concluding- AO3. This allowed for a different approach to the content using our knowledge learnt in lesson to successfully and confidently come across in writing in exam questions. *CH Year 12*

During the second half of the biology conference, our focus was on exam technique (specifically maths and statistics questions). We were taught about the statistical tests and given questions in exam context to practice. This was really useful, especially the part where we looked at evaluating statistics as we haven't yet learnt how to do that in lesson.

We then looked at the essay question from paper 3. We were shown past paper responses and taught how to mark them to give us an insight into what the examiner is looking for in our answers. We then got to practice this by coming up with essay plans. Seeing as year 12 has not seen the essay yet, it was a good introduction. *JG Year 12*

Biology Department Farasitic Worms Lectur

Dr Russ Morphew (whose brother studied at the Harvey in the 90's) came to give us a talk on parasitic worms. He is a senior lecturer at Aberystwyth University and has works published in a number of fields; Biochemistry, Veterinary Medicine and Parasites to name but a few. A big thank you must go out to him for sharing his knowledge and enthusiasm. Who knew parasitic worms can lay up to 250,000 eggs a day, that 1 in 8 people in the world are infected with round worms and that in Victorian times they were used as a slimming aid!

Year 12 you were brilliant as always – asking and answering questions and getting stuck into the practical aspect too. *Mrs Bennett*






The talk on gastrointestinal worms was really engaging in numerous ways. It looked at real life application of topics such as biochemistry, which have been covered in class giving a good opportunity to see where A-level biology can lead to after Sixth Form; looking both into higher education at University and further into the workplace. A particular highlight being how engaging Dr Morphew was and the practical element left the talk well rounded looking into not only the theory but, putting this into practice as well. CH Yr12





On Tuesday the 7th March, the year 12 biology class attended a talk given by a guest speaker from the University of Aberystwyth on gastrointestinal worms. Although on the face of it quite a queasy topic about the parasites which inhabit our intestinal system, the information was more intriguing than frightful, including the fact that over 1.2 billion people contain 1 type of parasitic worm. The speaker then passed around a collection of worms including specimens of tape worms and round worms for us to observe. Towards the end of the talk we were able to test some of the chemicals which could be used to treat the parasites using modern equipment such as dispensing pipettes to deliver paralysing drugs to samples of worms. *CA Yr12*

We had a lecture from a doctor who specialised in parasites to come talk to us about, not only types of worms and parasites but also a wider range of topics like drug screening. We got an insight into how major companies such as Pfizer tests drugs for use as we performed the steps ourselves with top grade equipment. Some interesting things included the mechanisms certain types of worms utilise to reproduce and remain undetected in the body. The lecture was also engaging and interactive too as we were able to have a look at real tapeworms and roundworms in jars which would have been previously in peoples' body. *LL Yr12*





I really enjoyed the talk on gastrointestinal worms, and I think that there was lots of interesting information that I learnt from it. I thought it was fascinating that worms can grow inside someone's body and avoid the immune system in the ways they do, and I also found it unbelievable that a tapeworm grew to a length of 65 metres in the intestine of a blue whale. Overall, I thought it was definitely worth my time to listen to the talk and would be interested in learning more about them in the future. EA Year 12

Y12 visit the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory

On Friday 10 March, the Y12 Physics students enjoyed a brilliant trip to the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory in Oxfordshire, for an insightful and exciting day of particle physics. The day consisted of numerous informative lectures, as well as a computer workshop, fascinating tour of the ISIS particle accelerators, and a quiz to round off the day (in which Davis came out on top of Harvey students and Frank won earlier in the day — both prize-winners) — not forgetting the delicious chilli lunch we had in the middle of all the action.



We kicked off the day with two short lectures: "A Very Brief Guide to Particle Physics" and "Fundamentals of Particle Physics" in which it was helpful to revise some of what we had covered in our own Physics lessons, such as synchrotrons, cyclotrons, and linear accelerators. group particularly enjoyed finding out more the history of about particle physics, as well as the science behind it.

We were then ushered into our computer workshop, during which

we had a crash course on Python, and were then encouraged to use our new skills to process data from collisions that occurred in a real particle accelerator. Daniel (being an experienced computer scientist) raced ahead, while the rest of us took the "slow and steady" approach. Some of the group received prizes (CERN merch!!) for their consistent effort and engagement during the session.

After lunch, we moved on to a visit of the ISIS Neutron and Muon source, which began with a short introduction outlining many of the uses of the laboratory and continued with a guided tour of facilities. We the were particularly intrigued by the idea neutrons work as 'reverse' of x-rays: while x-rays have no trouble penetrating skin, etc. they cannot penetrate bone, thus creating the well-known xof skeletons. ray images However, neutrons can through thick lead with no issue, but struggle to pass through organic matter. This means that allow neutron imaging can someone to clearly see a rose enclosed within a lead casket. It was also interesting to hear about



how components are tested at the laboratory to see how they withstand cosmic rays over time.

We finished off with a talk about how data from particle accelerators is processed and stored, and finally: the quiz. The whole group completely threw themselves into all of the activities, and everybody agreed that it was a lot of fun to get to experience physics outside the classroom, in a real lab. Thank you very much to Mr Lyng & the Office for organising the day; and Mr. Collins and Mr Simpson for accompanying the students on the day itself.

Year 13 Psychology Brain Day

On Tuesday 28th February, the Psychology Department welcomed Dr Guy Sutton, the eminent neuroscientist, for his exciting 'Brain Day'. Dr Sutton has lectured in neuroscience and genetics to a range of students, including medics, biologists and psychologists and has conducted research projects and data analysis for various organisations, including the Department of Health and the Medical Research Council. The day began with a talk on basic brain anatomy, examining different types of nerve cells and how genes work. He showed us images of cerebral organoids, which are bits of brain tissue grown artificially in a laboratory from stem cells. This raised lots of questions about consciousness and when the brain becomes aware of its own existence. We saw some fascinating brain images created from various scanning techniques and also learnt what happens when the brain becomes damaged. He also mentioned the effect of drugs, particularly on the adolescent developing brain.



Just in time for lunch we got to the best part of the day, the sheep brain dissection! Here we could really see all those different areas of the brain close up, giving the students a real-life insight into the anatomy of the

brain. After lunch, Dr Sutton focused in more detail on the Schizophrenic brain and the brains of criminals, revealing some very interesting technological advances in how we could potentially control the minds of criminals in the future and what the ethical issues surrounding this would be.

Dr Sutton was highly engaging and his passion for neuroscience really inspired our students. We have already booked him to return in October to spend the day with our current Year 12 students!

Year 9 History Imperial War Museum Trip

Year 9 historians embarked upon a trip to the Imperial War Museum in London on the 28th February 2023. The focus of the trip was to view and research the Holocaust exhibition with a teaching session from museum staff. This exhibition holds a variety of books, artworks, letters and personal objects, ranging from jewellery and clothing to toys and musical instruments, along with over 2,000 photos. It is a huge gallery spanning two floors, bringing together the stories of real people from the Holocaust and the Second World War. The Holocaust exhibition has been the 2022 winner of the 'Museum + Heritage Permanent Exhibition of the Year'. This visit really helped to connect classroom learning with artefacts from the period.



The Imperial War Museum has a variety of galleries and the pupils were able to explore a number of them in the afternoon. The First and Second World War Galleries were very popular with the pupils. The pupils explored weapons from both wars and also a First World War trench. The accompanying sound effects






YOUTUBE CHANNEL
