

# LIBRARY UPDATE!




# All about Lizzie




- Fin H, an excellent violinist who's been featured at an official orchestra before, who played 'Concerto in A Minor, BWV 1041',

- yours truly, who sang 'Don't Rain on My Parade' from the esteemed musical 'Funny Girl'.


# **The Christmas Carol Service**

# PANTO REVIEW

The Harvey Grammar School's gift to us this Christmas was a dazzling and hysterical spectacle of a pantomime: *Peter Panto*. Year 13 Students/playwrights, Harry P and Fraser C, reimagined J.M Barrie's classic play into a farcical delight. Rudy M (Head Boy), then turned script to stage, by directing a blockbuster full of grand sets, elaborate costumes, catchy songs, charismatic performances, and most importantly: the Christmas spirit.



At the start of the play, Wendy and her two brothers mistakenly go to Neverland, thinking Peter Pan was leading them to the Netherlands. Peter then promises to get them back home safe, however, plans get muddled once he learns that Dame Tinker Bell is likely to be captured by the dastardly Captain Hook. What follows is a spiral into the absurd and witty that only the great minds behind a Harvey Panto could conjure up.



Joseff B as Peter Pan leads with charm and confidence, while still giving room to his ever-so-talented accomplices, Wendy (Hew E) and Tinker Bell (Fraser C). Both give impassioned performances that show off how they're bound to become stars in their post-Harvey lives. Those three, supported

by the hilarious Abbott and Costello-esque Michael Darling (Reece M) and Jon Darling (Shay F), round up the heroes of this tale. But those actors are far from being the only highlights of *Peter Panto*, as Captain Hook (Rudy M) and his Jolly Henderson Crew steal, or I guess pirate, every scene they're in!

One of the many great surprises in this play is the new and original supporting character of Righty (Alex J), Captain Hook's right-hand man. The way the two of them bounce off of each other is sensational, their performance of 'Sexy and I Know It – LMFAO' is a sight to behold, and the growth of their relationship is so human and touching that you wish Righty existed in every other Peter Pan production.



However, anyone who's watched this panto knows that despite all of this, it's not Peter's story, it's not Hook's story... In reality, it's the story of John Thomas Smee. After dealing with too much abuse and neglect from Captain Hook, Smee wrestles internally with his identity and considers abandoning the Jolly Henderson Crew. For his entire life, he was defined by being a follower, and any form of self-expression was shutdown or made fun of. Naturally, this led him to being very vengeful, bitter, and envious. These traits paired with his frequent monologues is reminiscent of Shakespeare's lago. Only here, Harry and Fraser subvert the expected Machiavellianism, by creating a redemption arc where he ends up joining Peter and his friends. Smee goes from being a victim of abuse, to a runaway, to a pretender, and eventually once he finds his people, he can finally just be Smee.

Smee's arc is the key to unlocking *Peter Panto*'s philosophy. Every character similarly starts frustrated and selfish but gains self-acceptance because of the love around them. For example, in Mr Maull's most inventive cameo yet, he is shown to be upset that his identity is just chemistry puns, but with the encouragement of the audience, he's able to show that he has many other interests, and he actually saves the day. Captain Hook's lack of a hand is a symbol for him not being whole, he first tries to patch himself up by kidnapping Tinker Bell and using her magic, but it's unsuccessful. It's only once he gives up



villainy and opens up about his love for Righty, that he gets his hand back and becomes whole once more. *Peter Panto* at the end of the day, is an embodiment of festive optimism. The idea that in the coldest times, hurt people can come together and find warmth through kindness and connection.

Ultimately, the reason this pantomime worked so well, is because every step of the way you can just feel real care. From the original sets, to the expensive costumes, to the inspired using of lighting and sound. Rudy, Harry, and Fraser are a very conscientious, mature, and talented group of lads, so it's no surprise they captained this panto ship towards being the quintessential Peter Pan adaptation. Great poster as well by the way.

# **Peter Panto Interview**

I sat down with the writers of *Peter Panto*, Harry P and Fraser C (who also played Smee and Tinkerbell respectively), to interview them about their wonderful production.

## What was the biggest surprise with making the pantomime?

Fraser: I think the amount of work that it was. I don't think we estimated how much work it was going to be. Even though we did start in January, and we tried to get ahead as much as we could, still we were only well rehearsed enough to just be able to do it. Enough that we weren't over-rehearsed or under-rehearsed. I don't know what we would have done if we had started in February.

Harry: It was a surprise how much, how consistently you need to like round people up. We had to do a lot of chasing.

#### What do you think is the importance of the Harvey panto?

F: I feel like the panto is not just for people who want to act, it's actually about making friends and having a really nice experience and doing something you haven't done before.

#### Who do you think is the next Fraser Crook and Harry Petts in a younger year?

They humbly chuckled at the phrasing of my question, then responded.

- F: Floyd and Evan.
- H: Yes, Floyd and Evan!
- F: In Year 7.
- H: They played Marcus and the Parrot.
- F: They are like a pair, they're really good, they're friends and they were really well-behaved, and they were really good actors and they made it really funny by themselves.
- H: The Year 10s in the panto are also really promising.

#### What was the hardest and easiest part of making the panto?

- H: I think the easiest part is the actual directing in the rehearsal. The hardest part is trying to sort everything out in the framework of the school.
- F: There's a lot of permission needed and things like that which go into it. And I also think we underestimated how hard things are backstage. Not only with people talking backstage, but also with- we have a lot more set than has ever been done in a Harvey panto, so it was really difficult to organize all of that. It working was all thanks to Lukas Richardson, Freddie Gusto, and all of the rest of the tech and set team

#### What was your favourite performance other than your own?

- F: I think everyone was very good.
- H: Yes, I think everyone was very unique in a good way.
- F: I think the pirates as well were very good.
- H: The four pirates were very good.
- F: I think everyone when the show started really started getting great ideas about what their characters would do in certain moments.
- H: I think everyone's character was how it was imagined when writing. And I think Hook was the most likeable character, because of the performance.

# If Hollywood were to create a movie out of your Peter Pan script, which star would you like to play your characters?

Harry (mimes putting a phone to his ear): "Get me Harry and Fraser now!" We all chuckled, and then I repeated my question.

H: Oh, Cruisey, Cruisey! Maybe Alice and Jenny.

Eventually the joshing stopped, and they finally answered.

- F: Maybe Sarah Paulson as Tinkerbell. That would be if it was a woman. If it were a man, maybe Stanley Tucci. If he channelled his Caesar Flickerman, then that would be perfect.
- H: For Smee, it would have to be Toby Jones!
- F: Oh yeah, he's perfect. Oh! Natasha Lyonne for Tinkerbell.
- H (laughing): Captain Hook would be the guy out of Peep Show. David Mitchell.

  Righty could be anyone. Maybe the guy out of Cheers. Young Ted Danson.

#### What was your favourite joke or moment or scene?

- F: I think a lot of the funniest bits were improvised. All the stuff we said around the Ghostbusters scene.
- H: Yeah, that was really funny. I don't know, if it's something actually in the script, my favourite scene is act 2 scene 2 when the pirates realised they accidentally captured Wendy. The whole, "Ahh, I can get me revenge!"
- F: "It's not gonna work, you bunch of weirdos!"

## What was your happiest moment with the pantomime?

H: My happiest moment was when the curtains pull apart to reveal the Dead Man's Cove set, and everyone in the audience goes "Oooooo". It happened at every show, which was great.

# Was there any moment you were worried the crowd wouldn't like and you were surprised that they did?

- H: My bit when I come out on my own for the first two pirate scenes. I didn't expect people to laugh at the 100% off joke or whatever.
- F: That's the thing with pantos, people want to laugh. For me though, I just hated doing the opening bit.
- H: You can really tell that you had nothing to say.
- F: Well, it's just that originally, when you first come out, you're worried that they're gonna go "ew" like with the balloons. But when they start laughing it's like this is fine, they think I look funny, that's good.

# If you were forced to play a character other than your own, who would you have wanted to be and why?

- F: I don't think I could have done it as well as Harry, but I think Smee is a brilliant character.
- H: Probably Righty? I don't think I could do Captain Hook very well.

## What Panto story would you do if you were to write another one for the school?

F: Metamorphosis.

H (laughing): By Kafka.

- F: By Kafka.
- H: Endgame by Samuel Beckett.
- F: Standing at the Sky's Edge by Chris Bush. I have no idea. Rapunzel would be a good one.

# CERN PHYSICS TRIP

Our first day of the trip was spend travelling. We left from the Harvey early Thursday morning at 4:15am for Gatwick Airport for an 8:00am take off. When we arrived in Geneva we were given our rooms before getting some sleep after a long day.

On our second day of the trip, we went to some museums and exhibitions. The exhibitions focused on the machines and discoveries of CERN and the hadron collider.

On day 3 was our tour of CERN. It started with a talk given by a worker about the history of CERN. After the talk, we were escorted to the exhibitions and split into four groups to be taught about the engineering issues and challenges faced when creating the hadron collider. We were also told how the accelerators worked in sequence to speed up the particles.

After we had been shown the old prototypes, we were then taken to another smaller station where a main part of the collider was constructed. We learnt so much about the dynamics and engineering feats required for the collider to work. In the afternoon some of us went bowling.



On our last day we went into the mountains around CERN and Geneva – it was gorgeous and had amazing views over Geneva and its lake. We had two hours to just relax in the natural park on the border between France and Switzerland. That afternoon we flew back to London and then back home to Folkestone.

# GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT



On 17<sup>th</sup> November, 26 pupils from HGS were invited to Bouverie House Business Centre to attend a special virtual reality event to see how Folkestone Town Centre will be changed using almost £20 million of new regeneration funding. The students were shown a virtual reality model of the proposed changes to the area around the current bus station, and were given the opportunity to share opinions and feedback on the designs.

The proposals include creating parks on the current bus station and Forresters Way, adding green areas and additional seating along pavements, and installing artworks throughout the town with the help of the creative partner, Creative Folkestone. Year 8 pupils have been learning about sustainable urban living looking at integrated transport systems and community involvement in decision making, so this trip was the perfect opportunity to bring their learning to life.



#### A trip to the New Folkestone

On Friday 17th of November 2023, 8V class got the privilege of being taken to Folkestone centre where a group of people were holding a VR experience for the public and schools to enjoy. I was lucky enough to go on this trip with my Geography Teacher, Ms Chapman. The experience included 4 stages:

- 1. A work booklet where we could right down our ideas for the new Folkestone.
- 2. A VR headset experience that put you on a flying carpet reminiscent of the one from Aladdin that flew you around new Folkestone.
- 3. A feedback station where you could state your thoughts on the experience.
- 4. A drag and drop computer/gaming set up where you could (as the name implies) drag and drop things into Folkestone that you would like to see when it is reformed.

The VR was my favourite part of the experience because it was extremely immersive and very enjoyable. They even had a wind machine for extra drama when the flying carpet took off from out of the building and we were in the virtual world. We had a pot of coins in front of us on the carpet and by clicking a small trigger on a handheld device we could drop a coin in an area we thought was good.

Overall, the entire experience was very enjoyable (other than the lack of space in the venue) and I cannot wait to see if any of our suggestions are implemented into the town once it is rebuilt with the £20 million pounds they have been gifted to do so with.

# **ENGLISH DEPARTMENT**

If you have been up to the English corridor in the Main building since the start of the school year, you will have noticed some new additions. Some of the Children's Laureates: Sir Michael Morpurgo, Cressida Cowell, Anne Fine and Malorie Blackman, along with classic writers, Jane Austen and Charles Dickens, have joined the growing list of world class authors who are showcased on our walls.

The Harveian recently interviewed the Head of English, Mr Wise, about the mural project, this is what Sir had to say:



"When we started this back in 2020, we had a vision to promote reading to the students by getting some engaging images up on the walls – covering both genres and individual authors. When I approached a company that installed this type of work, they completed a mock-up of what a Harry Potter display might look like, when utilising stock graphics (Left)."

"Clearly, this was not going to inspire anyone – so I began my quest to create something original using book covers and original illustrations. I contacted Bloomsbury Publishing, who look after J.K Rowling's wizarding world, then I contacted Thomas Taylor, the cover artist from the first HP book, and finally I approached J.K Rowling herself to get her to agree to be the focus of the wall.

The result, as I'm sure you'll agree, is absolutely striking (Right)."




"From 2020 – 2022 we've added H.G Wells, J.R.R Tolkien, Sir Terry Pratchett, William Shakespeare, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Anthony Horowitz, a Gothic timeline, a Classics Wall and a library montage with 550 book covers.



Each wall takes time to design, we have to seek copyright permissions from the author or their estate, the publishing house and also from the illustrators for the images. However, we have built some momentum and every successful mural provides impetus for the next one."






Year 10 have been teaching other grammar.


The students researched key grammatical concepts and delivered to the rest of the class. We ended the term with a revision micro teach project. It is wonderful to see so many future teachers in the making!

National Language Competition 7-11 November 2022

This term, The Government Communications
Headquarters (GCHQ) ran a National (virtual) Language
Competition aimed at Year 9s in the United Kingdom. For
second year in a row, we had several teams representing
The Harvey Grammar School. Students grouped in a
team of four, worked together to solve virtual challenges
in various languages.

More than 3000 teams across the UK completed a series of challenges via a platform called 'Arena' in order to gain points. For each task, students had to use their code-cracking and solving skills to come up with a pattern or a solution called FLAG which it awarded them with certain number of points.





At the end of the week, the team

Awesome Smiling Deer scored 45

points winning the HGS challenge and getting into number 54 out of 3038 teams in England!

Well done! What is more, three of our teams were in the top 100.

#### **GCHQ** statement:


"The competition was fierce all week with teams from more than 500 schools across the UK putting their language

"The GCHQ challenge was very enjoyable and fun. It really pushed me, especially when we got to the more difficult questions. I would recommend that everyone should give it a go."





# **Year 12 Students Visit to Christ Church University**

Several Sixth form Btec students recently took part in a work place interview experience delivered by staff and students from Christ Church University. The first session involved an interview technique workshop followed by a 'speed' interview activity in the Trafalgar Room. The following week we

visited the University where the boys were invited to apply for a fictional position within the campus sports centre. Students from the university then set our boys a rigorous series of interview activities, that included a survival group task, an individual interview and a creative imagination group task. Assessments were made following each of the tasks and at the end of the morning three boys were crowned champions and told 'you're hired!

Throughout term 2 Mrs Lynch has been running a FRIENDS resilience programme with students from Year 7. The tensession intervention plan aims to build resilience

amongst some of our younger students and has endorsed by the World Health Organisation. The programme aims to increase social and emotional skills, promote resilience, and help prevent anxiety and depression. Adolescence is a transition period in which new challenges such as higher study loads, peer pressure, friendship difficulties, and physical development are faced. As this can be a stressful and difficult time for many of our students, the FRIENDS activities and ideas help provide positive coping skills and resilience to navigate setbacks and transition successfully into senior school

To help participants remember the FRIENDS skills and to provide structure to the program it uses the following acronym:

- Feelings (try to be aware of feelings and regulate negative feelings)
- Relax (do "relaxation" breathing, meditation and have some quiet time)
- I try to think helpful (positive thinking)
- Explore solutions (step plans and problem solving techniques)
- Now Reward Yourself (quality time together doing fun activities)
- Don't forget be brave! (practice skills everyday with friends /family)
- Stay happy and talk to support networks

**Year 7 : Building relationships -** *Self-worth; friendships (including online) and friendship boundaries* 



**Year 8 : Identity and relationships -** *Gender identity; sexual orientation; relationship boundaries; and an introduction to contraception.* 

**Year 9 : Healthy Lifestyles -** *Diet; exercise; lifestyle balance and healthy choices; and first aid.*



Can I ride my e-scooter to school or work?

No, it's Illegal...

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles and are required to be taxed and insured. It's not possible to get insurance for privately owned e-scooters, which means it's illegal to use them.

Can I ride my e-scooter on the pavement?

No, it's Illegal...

You cannot use e-scooters on public footpaths, cycle lanes or roads.

What happens if I'm caught using my e-scooter in public spaces?

The scooter may be seized and as a result, destroyed.

If stopped by an officer, you may be asked to complete a breath and drugs test. You also risk a £300 fine and six penalty points on your licence for no insurance.


