

DRAMA CLUB


This term drama club has continued with working on devised pieces.



"From the aquatically gorgeous set design to the hilariously meta script, the established rewrite of an original opera and an ambitious troupe of sailors, HMS Pinafore has solidified itself in the theatrical walls of our school as a true masterpiece of its modern time.

Having been in the cast and a named role in the show (Sir Joseph Porter KCB), Pinafore, originally, was a whirl-pooling performance in its early stages and took



its delicate stepping stones each day to reach its magnificent end, and it is safe to say that the show has truly come full circle. Despite its short run time, Pinafore is able to tell a story proportionate to its oceanic roots about an enamoured sailor and his pathway towards love, and delivers comedic timing perfectly. My sheer admiration for all the time and effort lead cast, chorus,



tech team, orchestra, choreographers and directors put into the show can never be written into words. The orchestra kept the river of harmony flowing throughout the show, sustaining power into it whenever they played. Hearing them live and seeing their devotion along with the actors is a perfect euphony that many critics may be looking for.

GEOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT



Geography Fieldwork 2024 - Kent Coast

On the Friday 22nd March 2024, Year 12 Geography students set out on a fieldwork day on the Kent coast learning different fieldwork techniques. Despite the forecast of rain, we set out to our first stop the dunes at Greatstone, where we carried out beach profiles and a survey of the dune's vegetation. Next stop was Dymchurch were we looked at how the £66m sea wall protects Romney Marsh from flooding. After lunch in Dymchurch, we arrived at Hythe beach, our final destination, here we just managed to carry out our final fieldwork before the heavens opened and the day was abandoned due to torrential rain. An enjoyable day's fieldwork that allowed our A-level students the chance to learn new ways to carry out fieldwork and start to prepare for their Geography coursework in Year 13.

Has the regeneration of Margate been successful?

"Yes, it has been successful, most definitely. After years in the doldrums, the new £17m Turner Contemporary art gallery has helped the old town around the marketplace to become quite upmarket with boutiques and galleries, well worth a visit".


"No, it is not a success. I live in Margate and wouldn't recommend visiting. The Turner Contemporary is disappointing and takes literally 20 minutes out of your day. The old town is nice on a hot weekend but completely dead for the rest of the time, the High Street is still suffering badly from empty shops. It's still very rough around the edges".

There are many opposing views on whether the Regeneration of Margate has been successful.

So, on Friday 19th April the Harvey's Year 12 Geographers set out on a day's fieldwork to answer this hypothesis: The regeneration of the Margate through the Turner Contemporary flagship project has not provided an economic stimulus to Margate's town centre.

After a train journey to Margate, changing at Ramsgate, we arrived ready for a day's fieldwork. We started by visiting the Turner Contemporary art gallery and surrounding area and then carried out various field work techniques such as interviews and environmental quality surveys to see how the area had improved. After lunch we looked at the High Street to assess if the regeneration had a positive influence in improving this area. After the day's fieldwork the jury is still out on whether Margate's economy has been stimulated from this regeneration but Year 12 are now much better equipped to carry out their own future geographical enquiries.

On Wednesday 17th April we welcomed students from our partner school, le Collège Ste Véronique in Liège, Belgium to shadow our Yr10 French students for the day.

They went to lessons together and we finished the day with games of football and dodgeball. There were lots of opportunities to practise speaking French.



Although the school football season usually finishes before Easter, with success comes added games. As such, midway through Term 5 saw our 2ndXI compete in the final of the County Cup against Farringtons School over at Herne Bay United.

Our opponents themselves had had a very good season, winning their league so we knew it was going to be a tough encounter.

The early stages were tight with neither team really having creating too much in the form of chances. After about 20 minutes, Farringtons won the ball on the halfway line & broke quickly. After a bit of a scramble in the box, the ball fell to a striker who put them ahead. This did not deter the boys though. If anything, from then onwards to the half, we were the better team.

After a chat at the break from Mr Hollier & Mr Walton, we came out in the second half positive & on the front foot. Periods of good possession throughout the second period followed, with Tom K, Finn G & Owen H causing all sorts of issues in the opponent's half. Never the less, the possession didn't really surmount to anything, with very few chances of note.

A quick counter with 10 to go almost cost the side, when a penalty was given for a trip inside the box. However, the Farringtons' captain couldn't make use of it, shooting wide of Tom M's goal.

With added time approaching, The Harvey went for it, changing to a very attacking formation, with balls forward the order of the day. Again, these didn't really lead to much more than a couple of half chances for Herbie S, Rocky V or centre back come striker Tom C. With the game all but over, a long clearance led to a one on one chance for Farringtons who made sure of the game with a smart finish to make it 2-0.

Despite the result, the side put up a great performance with many of those in attendance commenting on how well they played & probably should have deserved more. Especially against a Farringtons side who only have a 1stXI & who offer sporting scholarships to the majority of their squad.

CRICKET

<u>U12</u>



The year 7 squad of cricketers have had a busy term of fixtures. Following several after school net sessions their first game was away, on a damp Saturday morning, against Ashford School. Batting first we scored an imposing 108 from our 20 overs. The foundations were laid at the top of the innings with Toby S (19) and Olivier M (14) scoring freely against some good bowling. This was followed by a Captain's innings by Vinoj S who remained not out with 21. Despite using 11 bowlers we still managed to restrict Ashford to 74 with Rees H taking 3-10 and Finnian N-J 2-5.

Our next game was against Sir Roger Manwoods in the cup. Having won the toss and opting to bat, we restricted our visitors to 60 runs. Again captain Vinoj cleverly shared the bowling amongst the whole team with himself, Thomas B, Raff S & Toby S all claiming 2 wickets each. We quickly chased down the total with Isaac F (12) top scoring. Fortunes were reversed when we visited Norton Knatchbull. On a very 'difficult' batting track a combination of rash shots, poor running and excellent fielding saw us all out for just 29. A swift defeat soon followed when our hosts knocked off the runs in just 9 overs. Next up was a trip to The Duke of Yorks. We took the opportunity to get several new players involved (for many it was their first ever game of cricket). The result was again positive for all involved with every player making a contribution with bat or ball. Toby S (27) and Vinoj (11) top scored in our innings of 117. Both boys then took 3 wickets each to cap off great all round performances. However, the highlight was seeing some of our newer cricketers getting involved for their first game (and of course the excellent tea provided!). With a large squad of very enthusiastic cricketers, getting everyone involved and engaged, whilst remaining competitive in every game, will be our challenge. So far, the boys have been outstanding and show good promise for the future.

<u>U13</u>

The U13s have had a busy couple of weeks this term, starting off back in week 1 with an indoor inter squad game. This was a good lead up to our season & allowed Mr Walton to see plenty of keen cricketers who would have opportunities to play competitive school cricket as the Summer progressed.

Our first fixture saw us head to Sir Roger Manwoods in the County Cup, where we restricted the hosts to a modest total of 36. These were chased down quickly thanks to not out knocks from Joseph A & Finn L.

Unfortunately, in the next round, despite doing well with the ball & in the field to limit Kings Junior to 109 runs, our batting innings, despite seeing out the 20 overs, never really got going. We ended up on 86/2, ending up losing by 23 runs.

A friendly against Norton Knatchbull followed, which was a great opportunity for all in the squad to get some time in the middle, whilst also all having the chance to bowl. Winning with a wicket to spare off the last ball of the game, it was a great example of junior cricket for all involved. It also included Archie E's first ever wicket!

In the Plate competition, another away day to Wilmington Grammar in Dartford saw another victory for the squad, this time by 8 wickets. A hat trick opportunity for Jonah A was the highlight of our bowling innings & helped to keep their score down to under a hundred. These were knocked off quickly by the top order, with Ewan M top scoring on 44.

Currently top runs scorer is Ewan M in his debut season with 62, followed by Captain Alex L (38) & Zach F (30). Alex has also done well with the ball in his hand, leading the wickets chart with 7, closely followed by Sam A (6). So far, 16 students have been involved in our season, with plenty more to come with games lined up throughout Term 6.
